## Raptor Free Flight Program Lifts Off at Arizona-Sonora Desert Museum

Tucson, AZ (August 1, 2013) It's time to prepare for another season of Raptor Free Flight- the supercharged, untethered birds of prey exhibition. What makes this exhibition so impressive is that the birds fly completely free. "The birds fly so precisely and so close that visitors are often brushed by feathers and can feel the rush of air as the birds fly just above their heads," states Executive Director, Craig Ivanyi.

The demonstrations occur in the open desert showcasing natural activities of native birds as a narrator explains about their attributes, habitats and behaviors. Two presentations are scheduled daily beginning, Saturday, October 19<sup>th</sup> and continuing through April 20<sup>th</sup>, 2014.

The demonstrations feature the only raptor species in the world to hunt as a family group using strategy. These birds are native to Arizona and the Sonoran Desert. This year, the presentation will feature an increased family of six Harris' Hawks, in what promises to be an extraordinary display.

Other birds that will be featured in the presentations include Great Horned Owls, Barn Owls, Ferruginous Hawks, Gray Hawks, Prairie Falcons, Red-tailed Hawks, Chihuahuan Ravens and Peregrine Falcons.

"Forty-four raptor species inhabit the Sonoran Desert region and 37 species breed here," states Ivanyi. "The Museum's *Raptor Free Flight* program provides visitors a chance to witness the amazing aerial maneuvers of these spectacular birds which they would rarely see while hiking in the desert."

According to a spokesperson for the Association of Zoos and Aquariums, "Raptor Free Flight" is like no other demonstration in the country because the birds are the focus and are presented in their natural habitat."

Since the birds featured in the program change daily and the birds themselves can be unpredictable, no two shows are exactly the same. Visitors are encouraged to revisit on a variety of days as the bird encounter will be different each time. This is especially true of the Harris' Hawks as the family dynamic changes throughout the season.

The museum urges visitors to bring their cameras in order to capture the phenomenal presence of these majestic birds. When the birds fly free they appear truly wild. There is no extra charge for the *Raptor Free Flight* exhibitions which are included with general admission.

## The Arizona-Sonora Desert Museum

The Arizona-Sonora Desert Museum is one of the nation's leading outdoor, living museums, featuring more than 230 animals and 1,200 varieties of desert plants. Its mission is to inspire people to live in harmony with the natural world by fostering love, appreciation, and understanding of the bi-national, Sonoran Desert. The museum is located at 2021 N.
