PLANT CARE INFORMATION

Pipevine or Hierba del Indio

Aristolochia quercitorum

DESCRIPTION: This pipevine is a mat-forming groundcover native to the tropical deciduous forests of southern Sonora and Sinaloa, Mexico. A single plant can cover an area of 10 square feet or more. The felty-green leaves are 2 inches long. Flowers are maroon, and appear along the stems. It is a good larval plant for the Pipevine Swallowtail butterfly.

RECOMMENDED USE: Use as a ground cover or in a container to attract butterflies.

CULTURE:

160 m

Hardiness: Hardy to 20F. It is evergreen unless frozen; roots are hardy.



Sun tolerance: Full morning sun to moderate all-day shade.



Watering and feeding: On the light side of moderate water use. Fertilization is usually not needed unless kept in a container, but occasionally (twice a season) appreciated.



Soil requirements: Any soil, but thrives in deep, sandy soil.



Pruning: To control or to remove winter frozen stems.
