PLANT CARE INFORMATION

Stinking Passion Vine or **Tomate de Guajolote**

Passiflora foetida var. arizonica

DESCRIPTION: This is a fast growing vine found in canyons in Pima County, and south into Sonora and Baja California. Its glandular leaves exude a rank odor that gives the plant its common name. Literature says that its white and purple blooms are approximately 2" across although our plants' flowers are half that size. They appear during the monsoon season, although some were nearly cleistogomous (only the stigmas emerged from the flower bud). However, when open, the flowers belie the common name, as they have a wonderful aroma of lilacs. This species is a larval food plant for Gulf Fritillary butterflies.

RECOMMENDED USE: Use as a mounding groundcover or climbing on another plant or trellis.

CULTURE:

Hardiness: At least to 25, and possibly to lower 20's.



Sun tolerance: Best in light shade.



Watering and feeding: Moderate water user. Feed monthly during growing season.



Soil requirements: Any well-drained soil.



Pruning: To control.
